Background: The ability to conduct high quality translational research, an area identified as a national priority, is dependent on effective cooperation and collaboration between pathologists and researchers. Pathologists are required to provide specialist expertise and access to well characterised, high quality human biological samples. Despite many new opportunities to advance the understanding of disease and improve the diagnosis and treatment of patients, there are reports of severe shortages of academic pathology expertise and of increasing difficulties in engaging service pathologists in research. In response to this, NCRI established a Task Force to explore the issues and identify areas where action is required. While the Task Force was set up initially to respond to problems in cancer research, the issues affect other areas of medical research and the proposed solutions are expected to have benefits beyond the field of cancer.

This Workshop aims to introduce the work of the NCRI Task Force, highlight its recommendations and provide insight into how some of the recommendations are being converted into actions.
